TEXT-TO-911

What-Comm 911 can now accept text-to-911 when a voice call is not safe or possible to make

How to text 911 in an emergency:

- Enter "911" into the "to" or "recipient" field
- The first message should be your location and the type of help/assistance needed.
- Press send and stay with your phone
- Be prepared to answer questions, keeping your answers concise.

Important things to know about text-to-911:

- A text or data plan is <u>required</u> to place the text-to-911 message
- Silence your cell phone if in a dangerous situation because the 911 operator may send back an audible notification to you, depending on your phone settings.
- Text-to-911 is not yet available to all counties in Washington. You will receive an error message if it is not available in your county.

Who should use this feature?

- Any person who is deaf, hard of hearing, or has a speech difference
- Any person who is in a situation where it is not safe to place a call to 911
- Any person in a medical emergency who is incapable of speech, but able to text
- When cell service is spotty and a call cannot go through
